

Canadian Union of Public Employees, Local 218-Educational Assistant Unit and Durham District School Board, Reach Collective Agreement

The Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE), Local 218-Educational Assistant Unit and The Durham District School Board (DDSB), are pleased to announce that they have reached a collective agreement. The agreement pertains to the more than 1,100 Educational Assistants at the DDSB.

CUPE members ratification vote was held on June 14, 2016 and the DDSB ratified the deal at a Special Board Meeting held on June 13, 2016. This new deal will be in effect from September 1, 2014 to August 31, 2017, aligning with provincial settlements at the central bargaining table.
